The evening will also feature musicians Jo Sallins, Julissa Lee Rodriguez and Irene I-SHEA Shaikly, and include several surprise performances.

Ripple Effect

SO MUCH has been going on with **First Generation!** The ensemble is at the height of performing our new show Ripple Effect, with three amazing performances behind us at Springfield Technical Community College, Springfield College, and Hampshire College.

Ripple Effect is based on the personal narratives of the ensemble members' life stories. Through the use of poetry, movement, monologue and storytelling, the ensemble shares the strengths and struggles of their journeys, families and communities. Ripple Effect spans four languages and three continents. The ensemble transforms the stage into a meeting point of their lives in the present day. In Ripple Effect, the audience is transported from Springfield, MA to a U.S. army base, through a refugee camp in Tanzania, to a Nepali family's struggle for recognition, and the groups' fantasy world and dreams for the future. The ensemble has phenomenal courage and wild energy in this performance piece. All of them are enormously talented and have huge hearts!

Our goal is to continue to develop and improve Ripple Effect in the coming months!

This weeklong participation in the KO Festival is an opportunity for **First Generation** ensemble members to further build their performance skills, be immersed in an artistic community, work with theater professionals. The week will culminate in three performances of **Ripple Effect** at the Festival.

ANNOUNCING: First Generation Study Group

Springfield College student Ashley Farra, and Smith College students Katherine Fallon, Ashley Urrutia and Caroline Arcos have taken the initiative to start an exciting new academic mentoring program. Several **First Generation** members are gaining one-on-one academic support from the college students. They meet at the Springfield College library twice a week for this new study group. Through this mentoring, students are getting assistance with schoolwork, study and organizational skills, and college applications. The academic mentors are enjoying building relationships one-on-one with **First Gen** youth and supporting them to exceed in all aspects of their lives. Central to our mentoring work is the belief that we hang in with our mentees offering constant support through thick and thin!

First Generation is an intensive, arts and youth leadership program in Springfield, Massachusetts that provides a platform for young people to have a public voice in their community, and beyond.

The Performance Project creates theater about oppression and liberation. Through our multi-generational collaborations we examine the effects of racism, economic oppression, bigotry, and violence, and create compelling works of theater, movement, and spoken-word. Our performances engage audiences in dialogue about critical social and cultural issues.

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
