UBUNTU SUMMER ARTS PROGRAM


For the third year in a row, our UBUNTU Summer Arts Program brought together 50 children ages 7-12 with professional artists and First Generation members as Teacher Apprentices to experience theater, music, dance, drumming, storytelling, poetry, and journaling. We would like to share with you some of the children's journal entries from Ubuntu:
